Notable Updates

U.S. News

- According to national COVID-19 <u>trackers</u>, there are currently over 163,575 cases of coronavirus confirmed by lab tests in all 50 states with over 3,073 deaths reported. Notable new cases include:
 - The first US service member has died from the novel coronavirus, the US military announced on Monday.
 - Health officials have warned that the virus could kill as many as 200,000 people in America.
- According to the White House task force <u>briefing</u> Monday evening:
 - Trump said the next 30 days will be "very vital" in flattening the curve of COVID-19.
 - Over one million Americans have been tested so far and over 100,00 samples are being tested a day.
 - 30 million tablets from Sandoz and one million tablets from Bayer of hydroxychloroquine and chloroquine, which are potential COVID-19 treatments, were secured; Teva Pharmaceuticals is also donating six million tablets of hydroxychloroquine to U.S. hospitals.
 - Secretary Azar authorized Battelle's new decontamination machines, which can each sterilize thousands of essential N95 masks for reuse every day.
 - The Abbott point-of-care test has been authorized; the test can provide results to patients within five to fifteen minutes at the testing site.
 - The Javits Center hospital was completed; the U.S. Navy ship Comfort arrived yesterday equipped with 12 operating rooms and 1,000 hospital beds; additional temporary hospitals are in development in Brooklyn and on Wall Street.
 - The Army Corps of Engineers has awarded contracts for the construction of alternate care facilities at the State University at Stony Brook, State University Old Westbury, and the Westchester Community Center.
 - o 60 ambulances are being sent to New York City.
 - FEMA has allocated \$1.3 billion to New York City.
 - Additional ventilators are being shipped to Michigan, New Jersey, Illinois, Louisiana and Connecticut.
 - Approximately \$100 million worth of medical supplies will be sent to Italy from the U.S.
 - CEOs from Jockey International, MyPillow, Procter & Gamble, Honeywell, and United Technologies Corporation spoke about their contributions to COVID-19 relief efforts.
 - The Washington Post published an article on Trump's Rose Garden appearances with corporate executives. The article criticizes that the executives get more airtime than the medical professionals who are part of the White House virus task force.
- House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., said Tuesday that the coronavirus outbreak will likely require the country to move toward voting by mail in upcoming elections.
- Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker said Monday that the federal government sent the wrong type of medical masks in a shipment that his state recently received.
- Walmart announced it will soon start taking temperatures and doing basic health screenings of employees to detect workers who may be sick with COVID-19.
- <u>L.L. Bean CEO Stephen Smith</u> appeared on CNBC's Power Lunch, where he said the federal government has not done enough to address the crisis in the retail sector caused by the coronavirus. Smith expressed particular concern for middle market retail and apparel retailers.
- Amazon has fired Christian Smalls, the worker who led the Staten Island walkout. New York
 <u>Attorney General</u> Letitia James is now calling for an investigation of Amazon after firing the
 employee.
- <u>Brooks Brothers</u> announced it will convert its factories in New York, Massachusetts and North Carolina from manufacturing ties, shirts and suits to medical masks and gowns to combat the

- ongoing shortage of personal protective equipment. The company says it will be able to produce up to 150,000 masks per day.
- <u>Disney's top executives, including executive chairman Bob Iger and chief executive Bob Chapek, are taking pay cuts</u> as the coronavirus pandemic continues to ravage the media giant's stock and impede its operations globally.
- <u>BP will not cut jobs over the next three months</u>, Chief Executive Officer Bernard Looney said, even as the company seeks to reduce spending following an oil price crash.
- <u>Ford and GE Healthcare will begin manufacturing ventilators</u> designed by a Florida company at a Blue Oval components plant in Michigan.
- New states with restrictions to "non-essential" business or implementing "shelter-in-place" policies are:
 - The San Francisco Bay Area's shelter-in-place order deadline is getting extended until 'at least May 1'
- Notable new companies announcing layoffs/furloughs in the U.S. are:
 - o Gap will furlough 80,000 store workers in North America and Europe.
 - Neiman Marcus will furlough about 14,000 workers.
 - Macy's will furlough a majority of its 130,000 employees.
- Notable new companies that have stopped or are modifying production in the U.S. are:
 - Major automakers such as Ford, Toyota and others are continuing with <u>plans to restart</u> <u>U.S. vehicle production next month</u>.

International News

- According to global COVID-19 <u>trackers and official counts</u>, there are at least 796,000 cases confirmed globally in over 171 countries with at least 38,556 deaths. Notable new cases include:
 - o Italy had its lowest daily virus infections in two weeks.
 - o Spain's daily death toll hit its highest level to date.
 - The World Health Organization said there are signs of some stabilization in Europe's coronavirus outbreak.
 - Mexico's announced a health emergency including stricter measures aimed at containing the spread of coronavirus after the number of cases passed 1,000 and deaths rose substantially.
- Fiat Chrysler top executives will temporarily cut their salaries to preserve the automaker's financial soundness during the coronavirus emergency.
- <u>Credit Suisse bank could restrain 2020 bonuses</u> in a show of unity with victims of the coronavirus epidemic in Switzerland.
- Royal Bank of Canada will not cut jobs in 2020 as a result of the coronavirus outbreak.
- Lidl is donating thousands of fruit and vegetable bags to NHS staff across the U.K.
- <u>Japan will boost government bond issuance by \$149 billion</u> from July to fund a massive stimulus
 package aimed at combating the hit to the economy from the coronavirus pandemic.
- The coronavirus crisis could be the "opportunity of the century" for China to cement its place as a global power, a professor told CNBC on Tuesday.
- <u>China did not include asymptomatic individuals who tested positive for coronavirus</u> in their counts as the number of confirmed cases and deaths from the disease grew worldwide.
- The economic fallout from the coronavirus pandemic could drive an additional 11 million people into poverty in East Asia and the Pacific unless "urgent action" is taken, the World Bank warned in a report released Monday.
