Notable Updates

U.S. News

- According to national COVID-19 <u>trackers</u>, there are currently over 1.1 million cases of coronavirus confirmed by lab tests in all 50 states with over 67,795 deaths reported. Notable new cases include:
 - President Trump predicts that <u>coronavirus deaths could hit 90,000</u> in the U.S. on a Fox town hall Sunday.
 - As President Trump presses for states to reopen their economies, his administration is privately projecting a steady rise in the number of cases and deaths from coronavirus over the next several weeks, reaching about 3,000 daily deaths on June 1, according to an internal document obtained by The New York Times, nearly double from the current level of about 1,750.
- Notable new companies / organizations / states in favor of reopening the economy are:
 - <u>President Trump on Sunday sought to reassure Americans that it is safe for states to reopen</u> amid the coronavirus pandemic, offering support to protesters who have railed against the lockdowns across the country.
 - Utah Gov. Gary Herbert (R) placed the state under "moderate risk" protocols starting Friday, allowing certain establishments including gyms and salons to reopen and restaurants to begin offering a dine-in option with precautions in place.
 - After a wave of reopenings over the weekend, <u>at least six more states will begin allowing</u> certain <u>businesses</u> to open <u>back up on Monday</u>, the latest expansion in economic activity despite rising coronavirus cases
 - <u>Carnival Cruise Line announced plans Monday to resume service beginning Aug. 1</u>, despite concerns from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention that cruise ship travel "exacerbates the global spread of Covid-19."
 - As it anticipates a restart to its core rideshare business amid the pandemic, <u>Uber plans to</u> require drivers and riders to wear face masks or face coverings when using the platform in certain countries, including the United States.
- Notable new companies announcing layoffs/furloughs in the U.S. are:
 - Several more universities and colleges have recently declared they will be furloughing employees. These institutions join the ranks of several schools that had already made the decision to furlough staff in an effort to plug widening budget holes due to the virus.
 - Layoffs at two Pennsylvania casinos in recent months topped more than 3,000 combined. Parx Casino and Harrah's both filed WARN (Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification) notices with the Pennsylvania Department of Labor & Industry.
 - The <u>National Rifle Association has laid off dozens of employees</u>, canceled its national convention and scaled back on fundraising, membership and shooting events just months before the presidential election and during an unprecedented pandemic.
- Notable new companies halting production:
 - Demand for oil to fuel cars, planes and industry has dropped around 30% worldwide. The
 resulting supply glut has pushed U.S. crude prices well below production costs, forcing
 companies to start winding down operations. <u>Producers are shutting down the highercost output first and those are also the operations likely to stay shut the longest.</u>
- New states with restrictions to "non-essential" business or implementing "shelter-in-place" policies are:
 - Maryland Gov. Larry Hogan (R) <u>pushed back against pressure to lift his stay-at-home</u> <u>order</u>, saying he respects the rights of demonstrators who gathered over the weekend to protest the restrictions but that it is too soon to safely reopen the state.
 - New Jersey Gov. Phil Murphy announced Monday that the state's schools will stay closed for the remainder of the academic year to continue to curb further spread of the coronavirus.

- President Trump asserted during a Fox News town hall Sunday night that he's <u>"very confident"</u> the U.S. will produce a coronavirus vaccine by the end of the year.
- The Food and Drug Administration announced on Monday that <u>companies selling coronavirus</u> <u>antibody tests must submit data proving accuracy within the next 10 days or face removal from the market.</u>
- Gilead Sciences' coronavirus fighting drug will be in the hands of doctors and patients as early as this week, the biotechnology company's CEO said Sunday.
- The <u>Chinese government intentionally concealed the severity of the coronavirus from the international community while it stockpiled imports and decreased exports,</u> a Department of Homeland Security report found, according to an administration official familiar with the report.
- Roche has won emergency approval from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for an antibody test to determine whether people have ever been infected with the coronavirus, the Swiss drugmaker said on Sunday.
- World leaders will hold a pledging "marathon" on Monday to raise at least 7.5 billion euros (\$8.2 billion) for research into a possible vaccine and treatments for the coronavirus, although the United States is not directly involved.
- Even as the novel coronavirus pandemic draws attention and resources to the nation's doctors and hospitals, the health-care industry is suffering a historic collapse in business that is emerging as one of the most powerful forces hurting the U.S. economy and a threat to a potential recovery.
- <u>Native American health systems are stretching to a breaking point</u> under a growing number of coronavirus cases flooding into rural clinics and hospitals that are unprepared for the case load.
- New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo said on Monday that the state is now "on the other side of the mountain" as the daily number of hospitalizations, rate of new infections and deaths related to Covid-19 continues to decline.
- President Trump's announcement in March that Google was developing a tool to screen and schedule people for covid-19 tests heralded the yet-to-be-launched website as a way to streamline testing. But seven weeks later, that tool is available only in a handful of cities, and Google sister company Verily which was really behind the effort says it has facilitated slightly more than 30,000 tests as of Wednesday. That's a small portion of the more than 5.8 million estimated tests taken across the nation since the beginning of the pandemic, according to the COVID Tracking Project.
- <u>J. Crew filed for bankruptcy protection on Monday</u>. It is the first major retailer to fall during the coronavirus pandemic, though other big industry names including Neiman Marcus and J.C. Penney are also struggling with the toll of mass shutdowns.
- After a decade of spectacular growth, <u>Disney has been devastated by the coronavirus pandemic</u>.
 Its 14 theme parks (annual attendance: 157 million) delivered record profits in 2019. They're now padlocked. Its movie studios (there are eight) controlled a staggering 40 percent of the domestic box office last year. Now, they're sitting at a near standstill.
- Kroger, one of the country's largest retailers, said Monday that it will <u>help employees get a free</u>
 Covid-19 test if they have symptoms or qualify based on medical need.
- Department store chain <u>Kohl's Corp. is raising \$600 million through a note offering</u>. The notes would carry an interest rate of 9.5% and are expected to mature May 15, 2025, according to regulatory filings.

International News

- According to global COVID-19 <u>trackers and official counts</u>, there are at least 3.5 million cases confirmed globally in over 177 countries with at least 248,164 deaths. Notable new cases include:
 - The <u>U.K.'s death toll from the coronavirus is set to overtake that seen in Italy</u>: As of Sunday, the U.K. has seen 28,446 deaths as a result of Covid-19, closely behind Italy's 28,884 deaths, according to data from Johns Hopkins University.
 - New Zealand on Monday reported <u>zero new confirmed cases of COVID-19</u>, the disease caused by the coronavirus, over a 24-hour period.
- Spain reported its lowest daily increase in coronavirus deaths in six weeks on Sunday, with 164
 new deaths, as it eases stay-at-home restrictions after weeks under one of the strictest
 lockdowns in the world.

- <u>Italy on Monday began a precarious economic reopening after facing Europe's deadliest coronavirus outbreak</u>, with people reemerging from their apartments and homes with a mix of relief and apprehension.
- Japan's Prime Minister Shinzo Abe said on Monday he had decided to <u>extend the country's</u> national state of emergency to May 31.
- Politicians from <u>Australia and New Zealand are discussing the possibility of opening up borders to each other, creating a travel corridor -- or "travel bubble" -- between the two nations.</u>
- France plans to quarantine all travelers entering the country, including returning citizens, for two weeks as part of a new proposal to extend the health emergency put in place to limit the spread of the coronavirus, the country's health minister said Saturday.
- Officials in India have ordered all private and public workers across the country to use a
 government-backed app designed to trace the spread of the virus prompting concern from
 privacy advocates.
- Three months after Vietnam detected its first case of coronavirus, the country of more than 95 million hasn't reported a death from the virus and most of its 270 confirmed cases have recovered, the Wall Street Journal reports.



Conversation over time (US, past 7 days): April 28 – May 4, 2020




^{*}Note: overall mentions of COVID-19 have decreased by 1% since last week

Over the past week, there have been 1.3M traditional media articles and social media posts related to COVID-19 – this is a 1% decrease in coverage from the previous week. The majority (90%) of conversation is driven by social media.

- Top drivers of coverage for the week include news around state officials easing restrictions and Stay-At-Home orders, reopening phases, coronavirus vaccines and the possibility of monthly stimulus packages.
- On Twitter, posts share an New York Times <u>article</u> on the Trump Administration models that predict daily death tolls to double by June.
- Social traction began to ramp up at the end of the week as White House economic advisor, <u>Kevin Hassett</u>, told reporters that the Trump Administration is "studying very carefully" the possibility of a second round of stimulus packages to Americans in May.
- Additionally, conversation was driven by President Trump <u>claiming</u> that testing is the US is "better than any other country."

Search trends (US, past 7 days):



Over the past week, there was a significant boost in search interest around 'stay at home,' as Americans began to protest state restrictions. The stay-at-home revolts were reflective of small business owners wanting local economies to reopen in hopes to save businesses.

- The recent spike in search popularity for 'stay at home' started on May 2nd, after state officials announced eased restrictions that included reopening gyms, nail salons, and retail stores.
- Throughout the week major outlets, including NPR, published articles detailing the stay-at-home revolts that gained momentum after states like Georgia lifted stay-at-home orders.
