NEWS UPDATES Friday, May 1, 2020 Notable Updates

U.S. News

- According to national COVID-19 <u>trackers</u>, there are currently over 1.1 million cases of coronavirus confirmed by lab tests in all 50 states with over 63,766 deaths reported. Notable new cases include:
 - The USNS Comfort departed NYC's pier yesterday afternoon after serving the city's influx of coronavirus patients since March 30. It is heading back to its homeport in Norfolk, VA
 - The temporary field hospital set up inside the Jacob Javitz Center in NYC will also close today as the last dozen patients are scheduled to be discharged. 1,000 patients were treated at the facility over the last month
- Notable new companies / organizations / states in favor of reopening the economy are:
 - Utah Governor Gary Herbert announced that dine-in restaurants, gyms, barbershops and nail salons will reopen today. He also said that people will now be able to gather in groups of up to 20 people
 - Arkansas Governor Asa Hutchinson announced that gyms will reopen on May 4. All staff and gym-goers will be screened upon entering. Those who have recently traveled to New York, New Jersey, New Orleans and overseas will not be allowed in
 - Ford Motors outlined safety measures it will institute for the most profitable U.S. plants amid the coronavirus pandemic, convincing leaders of the United Auto Workers union to send members back to work
 - NASCAR announced that it will reopen on May 17 with a Cup Series race at Darlington Raceway in South Carolina, one of four it hopes to run without fans during the month of May. This would make it the first major U.S. sporting series to return to competition after being suspended due to the coronavirus outbreak
- Notable new companies announcing layoffs/furloughs in the U.S. are:
 - After announcing on Wednesday that they would be slashing 16,000 jobs due to a \$1.7 billion operating loss, <u>Boeing states it won't need a federal bailout, it's raising \$25 billion</u> through a bond offering
 - J Crew is filing for bankruptcy, working to secure \$400 million in financing to fund operations. The coronavirus outbreak brought devastating economic loss to the already struggling retail chain
- Notable new companies halting production:
 - Tyson is closing another one of their plants, this time in Logansport, IN after nearly 900
 workers test positive for the coronavirus. They will be closed over the weekend for a
 mandatory facilities cleaning
- New states with restrictions to "non-essential" business or implementing "shelter-in-place" policies are:
 - New York Governor Andrew Cuomo announced today that all New York schools will remain closed for the rest of the academic year
 - Ohio Governor Mike DeWine will extend his state's stay-at-home order that was set to
 expire today. However, dentists and veterinarians can reopen today. Manufacturers,
 distributors, construction and general office environments are allowed to reopen on May
 4
 - Minnesota Governor Tim Walz extends his state's stay-at-home order until May 18. There
 will be some flexibility allowing some retailers to operate curbside pick-up or delivery for
 customers
- New York Governor Andrew Cuomo announced that <u>NYC will shut down overnight Subway</u> service from 1am-5am beginning May 6 to help clean and disinfect all subway cars every 24 hours

- President Trump contradicted a statement from his own intelligence committee claiming that he has seen evidence that gives him a "high degree of confidence" the coronavirus originated in a laboratory in Wuhan, China, but declined to provide details to back up his claim
- Trump's administration is working on a long-term plan to punish China and place blame on them
 for the coronavirus pandemic. The plans consist of using sanctions, canceling US debt
 obligations and drawing up new trade policies
- Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell is looking to reopen the Senate as early as next week, but Dr. Brian Monahan, the Capitol's attending physician, said that there aren't enough coronavirus tests for all 100 senators
- 30 million Americans have now filed for unemployment since mid-March. First-time claims for unemployment benefits totaled 3.8 million in the last week. This represents roughly 18.6% of the US labor force
- JP Morgan Chase and Bank of America said on Thursday that they submitted nearly half a million applications worth almost \$46 billion to the Small Business Administration's Paycheck Protection Program for small businesses hurt by the coronavirus outbreak
- Delta, American and Frontlines airlines join JetBlue airlines in implementing a mandatory mask wearing protocol for all passengers starting May 4
- Shell, one of the world's largest oil companies slashed their dividend for the first time since World War II as oil demand continues to fall. It posted a net loss of \$24 million for the first quarter of 2020, compared with a profit of \$6 billion in the same period a year ago
- Amazon CEO Jeff Bezos warns that they could see a loss in the second quarter due to \$4 billion in coronavirus outbreak costs. They are still looking to hire \$175,000 employees and raise hourly wages by \$2 as well as overtime pay while outraged employees have demanded better protection

International News

- According to global COVID-19 trackers and official counts, there are at least 3.27 million cases confirmed globally in over 177 countries with at least 234,000 deaths. Notable new cases include:
 - Russian Prime Minister Mikhail Mishustin has tested positive for the coronavirus and will self-isolate
 - Australian capital Canberra declares itself free of all known coronavirus cases, the first time in seven weeks
 - There are over 2,100 Indian citizens that want to be evacuated from the U.S. but they are stranded until India lifts its coronavirus lockdown
 - Japan's low testing rate is raising questions on why their confirmed coronavirus cases are so low. Since February, only 10,981 people have been tested for the coronavirus. Of those, just over 4,000 were positive.
- According to a research study, more ethnic minorities are dying at a higher rate from the coronavirus than their white counterparts in England and Wales
- U.K. bakery giant Greggs is postponing reopening its stores after initially pushing for the stores to open next week. They now fear that the stores reopening will draw large crowds and they will be unable to operate effectively with social distancing measures
- Tensions escalate in Russia as medical facilities in the country have emerged as one of the main breeding grounds for the coronavirus and two dozen hospitals have had to shut down for long quarantines, with many doctors getting infected. Russia's total number of reported coronavirus cases surpassed 100,000
- India's Government is likely to cap its overall spending on coronavirus-related relief at around \$60 billion, due to concerns that excess spending could trigger a sovereign rating downgrade
- South Korea's Health Minister proclaims that the country is beating the coronavirus without a major lockdown by robust public health response based around extensive testing and techpowered contact tracing to keep their citizens safe
- China is spearheading the way for how the coronavirus has changed global business forever.
 Global companies like Nike, Starbucks and Disney are developing new strategies that won't bring life back to normal. Instead, they say the crisis could permanently upend the way we work, shop and manage our businesses

• In Norway, they plan to temporarily ease tax rules for oil firms to try to aid in the coronavirus pandemic with crude oil prices collapsing. This plan could boost the liquidity of oil companies by as much as \$9.7 billion until next year
